The International University of Monaco was founded in 1986 to bring opportunities for undergraduate and graduate programs in business administration to the dynamic region of Southern France. Located near both the Prince's Palace and the traditional town of Monaco, the University has a culturally diverse student body with a career focus in the international business arena.

Most coursework is in English, with a few courses taught in French. The academic philosophy of IUM combines a European rigor with an American practicality. The faculty currently represents over fifteen different nationalities and the student body, only 300 students in all, comes from over 25 nations worldwide. All classes are kept small and offer students an intimate learning environment in which teacher-student interaction is strongly encouraged, and student needs can be readily addressed.

The undergraduate business program offers an interdisciplinary approach to management, marketing, finance, accounting, economics and quantitative analysis. Students are also encouraged to study one of the following foreign languages: Chinese, French, German, Italian, Russian or Spanish. They will have access to excellent off-campus sporting facilities and of course can enjoy numerous water sports along the coast. The French Alps, where students can enjoy winter sports and skiing, are only an hour and a half away. Students can also use a modern business library and computer lab. Regional excursions and local, social activities and events are organized by the University's active Student Association.

Room and Board

There are no on-campus dormitories or residence halls; however, IUM can place you in an apartment in the nearby seaside towns of Cap d'Ail or Roquebrune Cap Martin. Apartments are either single, double or multiple occupancy and come fully furnished. IUM can also help place students with a local French family upon request. Students will make all room and board payments directly upon arrival to the necessary party.

Living in Monaco is quite expensive, as it is a major European resort area. Personal expenses such as laundry, entertainment, and local transportation are approximately \$3,000 per semester above those listed above. Additional student expenses will vary according to individual spending habits and travel. The total cost of books, supplies, and personal expenses also may

increase or decrease depending on the rate of exchange at the time of study.

Requirements

- Completed application, signed by your academic advisor
- Essay
- Two faculty recommendations
- Official transcript
- Personal interview
- \$500 nonrefundable deposit is due upon acceptance (deducted from the program cost)

Academic Credit

Students are registered at the University of Miami and earn 12-18 undergraduate or credits per semester for all approved courses. Upon completion of the courses overseas, a transcript from the overseas university will be sent to the IEEP office. The grades and credits will be converted to UM grades and credits according to the Grading Scale established by International Admission. The course titles, grades, and credits will be reported to the Registrar and placed on your UM transcript. Non-UM students will

receive a UM transcript, and one will be sent to the Registrar of your home university.

Travel Arrangements

Students are responsible for making their own travel arrangements.

Financial Aid

Most forms for University of Miami financial aid are available to UM students studying abroad. Students receiving financial aid from other institutions should contact their financial aid office to determine if the aid is transferable. Medical Insurance

Participants are required to secure health insurance to provide adequate coverage for any injuries and/or illnesses that they may sustain or experience while participating in the program, including coverage for medical evacuation and repatriation of remains.

Passport and Visa

A valid passport is required for travel abroad. Students should inquire at the U.S. Passport Agency in their city or contact their local U.S. Post Office for information. Student visa information will be provided upon acceptance.
